25 VERSES FOR THE SEASON



This advent and Christmas season is likely to be like none we have experienced before. Who knew what the year 2020 would be like back in January; a year where things have been uncertain, and the journey for all has been challenging, never knowing what would happen or change from week to week, but still we have been serving and worshipping an unchangeable and faithful God.

Advent is the time of waiting and hoping and longing for the promises of God to be fulfilled, and Christmas is the time when we remember that God came down, to a broken and hurting world, and stepped into the mess with love, hope, light and peace. If anything, there is no year in the lifetimes of most of us when these messages have been more needed and need to be more central to our lives.

I encourage you to set some time aside to use this season to focus on God and his promise and the coming of Jesus.

Enclosed in this pack are advent candles for you to light each Sunday and a verse to read for each day and reflect on along with some prayers that you may like to use. From December 3rd we will resume our Thursday Morning Prayer service at 10 am then again on the 10th, & 17th December, returning on January 14th.

Spiritually preparing one's heart by focusing on the colours of Advent in the weeks leading up to Christmas is a great way for us to keep Christ the centre of Christmas. The Four Last Things – Death, Judgement, Heaven and Hell – have been traditional themes for Advent meditation. The characteristic note of Advent is therefore expectation and preparation rather than penitence, although the character of the season is easily coloured by an analogy with Lent. Hope, Love, Joy and Peace are what the advent readings and candles represent. There is a sense of alert watchfulness, but the fundamental Advent prayer remains ‘Maranatha’ – ‘Our Lord, come’ (1 Corinthians 16.22).

The Advent wreath, typically a circular garland of evergreen branches, is a symbol of eternity and unending love. There are four candles, one for each Sunday leading to Christmas and a fifth candle for Christmas day. These three principal colours of Advent are packed with rich meaning.

**Purple** is the first Advent candle and is traditional liturgical colour. In the northern hemisphere, the Advent season falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout Advent and Christmas. This hue symbolizes repentance Christians show their devotion to God and prepare their hearts for his arrival. Purple is also the liturgical colour for the season of Lent, which similarly involves a time of reflection, repentance, self-denial, and spiritual readiness.

**Purple** is also the colour of royalty and the sovereignty of Christ, who is known as the "King of Kings." So, purple in this application demonstrates the anticipation of and reception of the coming King celebrated during Advent. The first candle of the Advent wreath, the prophecy candle, or candle of hope because it symbolizes the promises the prophets delivered as messages from God; promises that foretold Christ's birth is purple. The second is called the Bethlehem candle, or the candle of preparation, and it is also purple. Likewise, the fourth Advent candle colour is purple.

**Pink** (or **rose**) is the third Advent candle on the wreath used during the third Sunday of Advent (*Gaudete* or 'Rose Sunday'), It is named the shepherd candle or candle of joy.

Pink or rose represents joy or rejoicing and reveals a shift in the season of Advent away from repentance and toward celebration. The last days of Advent were marked by the sequence of Great 'O' Antiphons, which continue to inspire modern Advent hymns and meditations.

**White** is the fifth Advent candle positioned in the centre of the wreath it is called the Christ candle its colour representing purity, light, regeneration, and godliness. White is also a symbol of victory.

The fifth candle represents Jesus Christ himself who is born to save people from their sins, pure Saviour. It is a celebration of the fulfilment of prophecy as represented in Christ's birth and hope in the final fulfilment when Christ comes again, and Christians join him. Jesus is the light come into a dark and dying world.



## Advent: 25 VERSES

1. Mark 4:39 'He rebuked the wind and said to the sea, 'Silence, be still'. And the wind abated and there was a great calm'.
2. **Psalm 96:1 'O sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth.**
